Drive Safe Hampton Roads President's Message

Dear Drive Safe Members,

As 2020 comes to a close, I want to thank you for your great work and for your commitment to our organization and to our mission. It has been a tough and challenging year. When I became President, my goals included maintaining a presence in Hampton Roads and to increase our donor sponsorship. What first began in 1988 as Concerned Citizen's Advocating Traffic Safety (CCATS) is now Drive Safe Hampton Roads (DSHR), 32 plus years later. The organization is still active but at a more conservative level of activity due to the COVID-19 restrictions.

Before 2021 begins, I want to take a few moments of your time and fill you in on a few highlights of 2020. I believe these are things we should be proud of.

- * Old, Used, Borrowed and Abused Child Safety Seat Round-Up 2020 netted 175 seats in February.
- * Get It Together High School Seat Belt Challenge finished up in the spring with 32 local high schools being recognized. Unfortunately, the awards breakfast had to be cancelled due to Covid-19. But thanks to students' efforts, seat belt use by teens increased nine points from the Challenge's baseline percentage, making it 89%. **This is four percent higher than the state average seat belt use. The 2019-2020 Challenge kicked off the 23rd year for this Legacy program, with over 800,000 students being touched by this program.
- * Commercial Motor Vehicle Driver Appreciation Days have been held for 27 years and typically has almost 200 trucks that drive through each of this twice-yearly event. We had new Covid-19 rules limiting the number of volunteers pitching in to distribute goodies to area commercial motor vehicle drivers but both events were successful!
- * The 2019 John T. Hanna Awards for Excellence in Traffic Safety was held January 28, 2020 at the Princess Anne Country Club. There were eight awards presented including our own Patricia Davidson as the 2019 Lifetime Achievement Transportation Safety Award recipient.

It's been a different type of year, one with lots of challenges and changes. I give thanks for all that we have achieved this year and look forward to what we will be able to accomplish in 2021. I hope we will be able to start up with a soft opening of more DSHR activities starting June 2021. Together, we are all moving Drive Safe Hampton Roads forward. Thank you for all you do for the organization, for our community, and for our mission. It is such a great honor and privilege to work with the quality of persons that are a part of this great organization. Have a blessed and wonderful holiday season!

RESPONDER FATALITY INFORMATION

Jack Sullivan with Responder Safety recently gave a presentation on responder fatalities only, not counting struck-by.

Here are some of the interesting facts he shared:

In 2019, there were 44 responder Fatalities (41 on-duty & 3 off duty)

- 18 Law Enforcement
- 14 Tow
- 3 Mobile Mechanics
- 9 Fire/EMS
- 0 SSP (Safety Service Patrols)

Breakdown of the 44 incidents:

- 17 Disabled Vehicles
- 12 Crash Scenes
- 6 Traffic Stops
- 2 Fire Scenes
- 1 EMS Standby

So far for 2020, up to November 13, 2020, there have been 44 fatalities:

- 16 Law Enforcement
- 21 Tow
- 4 Fire/EMS
- 3 SSP (Safety Service Patrols)

FACT: Are you a lingerer? 29 states have laws directed at left-lane lingerers—those who drive in the left lane rather than use it for passing (or exiting) only. A 2016 AAA study found that nearly 80 percent of drivers reported feelings of anger and aggression when slow drivers wouldn't get out of the left lane, and 51 percent said they "purposefully tailgated". Ohio slogan - "Camp in our state parks, not in the left lane". If you aren't passing or exiting left,

then don't hang out in the left lane...

GUIDE HELPS STATES IMPLEMENT SUCCESSFUL PEER-TO-PEER INITIATIVES

Identifies elements critical for creating strong, measurable programs

Motor vehicles remain the leading cause of death for teens and young adults. To help states further this progress, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has released the "Peerto-Peer Teen Traffic Safety Program Guide," prepared by the Governors Highway Safety Association (GHSA).

Written for State Highway Safety Offices (SHSOs), the guide examines peer-to-peer programs, in which young adults take the lead in identifying a traffic safety problem their school and community and taking action to address it. The programs offer young leaders the opportunity to not only formulate but also implement and evaluate a plan to educate their community about the identified issue.

Working with an expert panel of researchers, advocates, youth organization leaders and young adults, the following eight success indicators for peer-to-peer programs, were identified and are discussed in detail in the Peer-to-Peer Guide:

- **Youth-led:** Youth, not adults, develop, implement and assess the initiative.
- **Inclusive:** Initiatives welcome youth from diverse cultures, ethnicities, abilities, genders and economic backgrounds.
- **Sustainable:** Adults provide support and resources needed to sustain the initiative.
- Facilitated training: Both youth and adults receive ongoing training addressing working together to address safety issues.
- Clearly defined, measurable learning objectives: Youth identify and investigate a problem to determine the way best way to address it.
- **Positive:** Positive learning experiences and messaging are used to motivate safe choices.
- **Incentives and recognition:** Both are used to motivate youth to participate in the initiative.
- Evaluation: Success is measured in changes to peers' behavior, knowledge, attitudes and/or awareness of the issue.

Fatal crashes involving drivers 16-24 years old have declined more than 25% over the past decade.
