
# **MEMBERSHIP: DON'T FORGET TO REPORT YOUR IN-KIND HOURS**

# Peninsula Driver Appreciation Day Giveaway Items Needed

The Network of Employers for Traffic Safety (NETS) has released an updated Cost of Motor Vehicle Crashes to Employers report and accompanying Cost of Crashes Calculator, developed by NETS through a cooperative agreement with NHTSA.

The report is provided for employers to understand the cost of crashes incurred by their occupational fleets, in addition to the on- and off-the-job costs of crashes for all their employees and their employees' dependents.

While the driver or passengers may sustain injuries from a collision, their employer is also likely to feel the impact. That's why many employers are taking an active role in educating their employees on safe driving. Implementing proactive safety initiatives such as defensive driver training and establishing comprehensive policies surrounding distractions, seat belts and fatigue are just a few measures employers can take to reduce employee risk behind the wheel.

# HRTPO BOARD APPROVES CMAQ AND RSTP PROJECTS AND ALLOCATIONS

The HRTPO is directly responsible for project selection and awarding of funds under two federal funding programs, namely, the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ) and the Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP). CMAQ project types include planned improvements to address congestion, public transportation, bicycle and pedestrian, and freight. RSTP may be used to fund a wide range of transportation projects such as improvements to highway capacity, accessibility, and operations. The HRTPO Board approved FY 2027 funding to 34 projects across the region. This includes \$15.1 million to 20 CMAQ projects and \$37 million to 14 RSTP projects. 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# NATIONAL HEATSTROKE PREVENTION DAY IS MAY 1, 2021

Heatstroke is one of the leading causes of vehicular not-in-traffic non-crash-related deaths for children under 14. Sadly, from 1998-2020, a total of 882 children died due to vehicular heatstroke. Yet, this tragedy is 100% preventable. While it seems like an impossible mistake to make, every parent or caregiver can potentially become distracted, and distractions often fuel this devastating situation. No one is immune. # FACT:

In the U.S., on average, every 10 days a child dies from heatstroke in a vehicle. According to the National Safety Council (NSC), twenty-four percent of these deaths occurred while a parent or caregiver was at work.

# NSC SURVEY: PARENTS LESS LIKELY TO BE DISTRACTED BY TECHNOLOGY WHEN DRIVING WITH CHILDREN

Parents rank texts, phone calls and children in the back seat as the top three driving distractions, according to a new survey. While backseat passengers certainly demand extra attention, the survey encouragingly found parents are less likely to be distracted by technology when driving with their children in the car. Parents also ranked the top deterrents to phone use while driving, which included having your child tell you they felt scared when you used your phone, having a loved one injured or killed, or being involved in a crash yourself. 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The first president of the new coalition was Clint Franklin, an EMS program coordinator from TCC. The CCATS logo was developed by the graphic arts department at TCC and designed to look like a highway sign.

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# **'FOCUS ON THE DRIVE'**

Communities across the U.S. are facing uncertainties and grappling with how to address the needs of individuals while combating the historic COVID-19 pandemic. For us, zero is the only acceptable number. As we look at how COVID-19 is impacting transportation safety, we have an opportunity to make changes that will yield long-term success and help us rethink our transportation systems.
